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INSTALLING THE ADAPTER AND INTERFACE MODULES

SECTION

1

This section explains how to install one or two HP 82401A HP-IL Interface modules in the HP 82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter, and how to install the adapter in the HP-71B Handheld Computer. You should be familiar with the basic concepts of HP-IL. For an introduction to HP-IL and its use with the HP-71, refer to Section 1, "Getting Started," in the *HP 82401A HP-IL Interface Owner's Manual*.

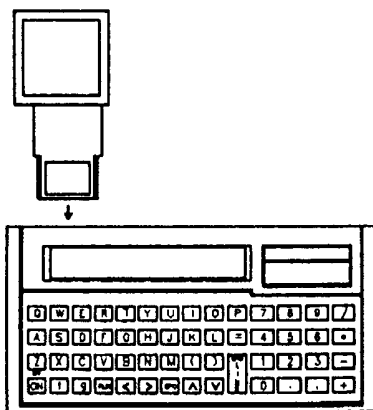
To install the adapter and interface modules, follow the instructions below:

CAUTION

Be sure the HP-71 is turned off before connecting or disconnecting the adapter or interface modules. If this is not done, the system's operation may be disrupted.

If an HP-IL interface has already been installed in the HP-71, turn off the computer and remove the interface. *Now turn the computer on, then off again.* (This clears the system buffer so that it can be reinitialized for operation with the adapter installed.)

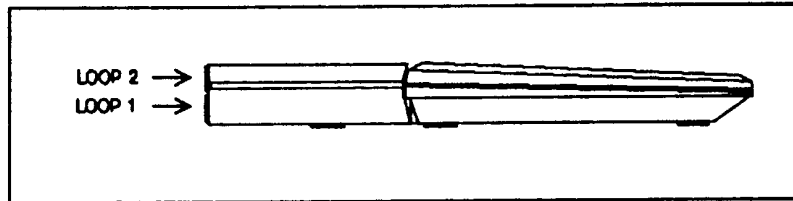
Install the interface modules in the adapter, being sure the slot in the end of the interface is towards the bottom of the adapter. Push in the interface until it snaps into place. *If only one interface is installed, it must be in the lower port.*



The adapter plugs into the HP-IL port at the back of the HP-71. First slide the cover off the port, then insert the adapter. Be sure the slot in the end of the interface is towards the bottom of the computer. Push in the adapter until it snaps into place.

Installing the Adapter and Interface Modules

Once the interfaces and the adapter have been installed, the interface in the lower port becomes *loop 1*. The interface in the upper port becomes *loop 2*.



You can now connect peripheral devices to each HP-IL interface in the usual manner. (Refer to the *HP 82401A HP-IL Interface Owner's Manual* for details.) *The loops must be distinct. You cannot cross connect the two loops.*

NOTE

If your HP-IL interfaces have different release numbers, put the interface with the latest release number in the bottom port of the HP 82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter. This insures that the latest version of each command will be used. (When executing an HP-IL command, the HP-71 searches first the interface in the bottom port, then the interface in the top port of the adapter.) To determine the release number of an HP-IL interface module, use the `VER#` command (refer to the *HP-71 Reference Manual*).

EXTENDED HP-IL SYNTAX

SECTION

2

The syntax for HP-IL commands is extended to accommodate multiple loops. HP-IL commands may specify an optional loop number in addition to the device specifier. If the loop number is not specified, the default is loop 1. The HP-IL interface plugged into the lower port of the adapter is loop 1; the upper port is loop 2.

2.1 LOOP NUMBER SPECIFIER

You can specify the optional loop number in an HP-IL command by including a numeric expression in the command. The correct method of doing this depends upon the command. There are three distinct cases:

Case 1: If the command requires a device specifier, append a colon followed by a numeric expression (the loop number) to the device specifier. For example:

PRINTER IS PRINTER:2 assigns the standard print device to the first printer in the second loop.

OUTPUT %66(2):2 ; "ABCDE" outputs the string to the second device in the second loop that has an accessory ID of 66.

ENTER LOOP:2 ; A# reads in data from the second loop.

Case 2: If the command requires no parameter (for example, CONTROL ON), simply specify the loop number with a numeric expression. For example:

CONTROL ON 2 sets the controller role in the second loop.

DISP STATUS(2) displays the status of the second loop.

Case 3: If the command takes a parameter that is not a device specifier, insert the loop number as the first parameter and follow it with a semicolon. For example:

ENABLE INTR 2 ; 64 sets the interrupt mask to 64 in the second loop.

2.2 SYNTAX CONVENTIONS

When you use BASIC statements and commands, you must use proper *syntax* in order for the computer to understand their meaning. The following syntax guidelines are used throughout this section.

DOT MATRIX TYPE Words in dot matrix type may be keyed in using either lowercase or uppercase letters, but otherwise must be entered exactly as shown. Commands, statements, and functions entered in lowercase are converted internally to uppercase.

italics type Items in italics are the parameters you supply, such as a *filename*.

' ' , " " Filenames and other character strings can be enclosed with single or double quotation marks and can be entered in lowercase or uppercase letters. Quoted filenames are converted to uppercase internally.

[] Square brackets enclose optional items.

| If items are separated with a vertical bar, you may choose one or the other of the items, but not both.

{ } Braces indicate that an item is required. Usually, the braces are used in conjunction with the vertical bar to indicate that one of a series of items is required. For example, { 1 | 2 } indicates that either 1 or 2 may be selected.

2.3 DEFINITIONS OF STANDARD TERMS

Several syntax items are common to many of the command syntax definitions. These "standard" items are used to define an HP-IL device or to define a file in an HP-IL device.

The syntax definitions for the standard items are given in alphabetical order below. Note that some of these items use other items as part of their definitions.

accessory ID Numeric expression, which is rounded to an integer (range 0 through 255). (This indicates the accessory ID of an HP-IL device.)

accessory type Two-part item:

1. A $\frac{1}{2}$ symbol followed by an *accessory ID*.
2. Optional *sequence number*.

assign code String expression (or unquoted string) that evaluates either to one letter or else to a letter followed by a letter or digit. (Avoid using as an unquoted string. If an assign code is also a valid variable name, it will be interpreted as an HP-IL address.)

device ID

String expression (or unquoted string). (This indicates the device ID of an HP-IL device. Only the specified characters are compared.)

device specifier

Any one of the following:

- *accessory type* with option of starting with : (colon).
- *assign code* with option of starting with : (colon).
- *device type* with option of starting with : (colon).
- *device word* with option of starting with : (colon).
- *HP-IL address* with option of starting with : (colon).
- A . (period) followed by a *volume label*.

device type

Two-part item:

1. A *device ID*.
2. Optional *sequence number*.

device word

Two-part item:

1. Any one of the following reserved words:
 - DISPLAY
 - GPIO
 - GRAPHIC
 - HP1B
 - INSTRMT
 - INTRFCE
 - MASSMEM
 - MODEM
 - PRINTER
 - RS232
 - TAPE
2. Optional *sequence number*.

Extended HP-IL Syntax

<i>file name</i>	String expression (or unquoted string) that evaluates to a letter and up to nine additional letters and digits.
<i>file specifier</i>	Two-part item: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. A <i>file name</i>.2. A <i>device specifier</i> that must include either a : (colon) or a . (period).
<i>HP-IL address</i>	Numeric expression, which is rounded to two decimal places: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Integer part (indicates device's simple address or primary part of extended address). Range: 1 through 30.• Fractional part (if nonzero, indicates device's secondary part of extended address). Range: .01 through .31.
<i>loop number</i>	String expression (or unquoted string) that evaluates to LOOP, with option of starting with : (colon).
<i>sequence number</i>	Numeric expression enclosed in (); expression is rounded to an integer. (This defines the <i>n</i> th device of specified type.) The range is 1 through 16; the default is 1.
<i>volume label</i>	String expression (or unquoted string) that evaluates to a letter and up to five additional letters and digits.

This subsection defines the extended syntax of each HP-IL command. The syntax definition of each command is given within a box. For each command, one or more examples are given below the box.

APPENDIX

A

A.1 CARE OF THE ADAPTER

The HP82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter does not require maintenance. However, there are several precautions, listed below, that you should observe.

CAUTION

- Do not place fingers, tools, or other objects into the plug-in ports. Damage to the adapter contacts and the computer's internal circuitry may result. Such actions could result in minor electrical shock hazard and interference with pacemaker devices worn by some persons.
- Turn off the computer (press **f** **OFF**) before installing or removing the adapter. Turn off the computer before installing or removing an HP-IL interface if the adapter is installed in the HP-71.
- If an interface jams when inserted into a port, it may be upside down. Attempting to force it further may result in damage to the computer, the adapter, or the interface.
- Handle the adapters very carefully while they are out of the computer. Do not insert any objects in the adapter connector sockets. Always keep a port cover over the HP-IL port in the HP-71 when an interface or adapter is not installed. Failure to observe these precautions may result in damage to the adapter, an HP-IL interface, or the computer.

A.2 DIAGNOSTIC PROCEDURE

In the event that the HP-71/HP-IL systems appear to be malfunctioning, a simple diagnostic procedure may be performed to determine which component is not working properly. This procedure consists of the following steps:

- Verify the proper operation of the HP-71.
- Verify the proper operation of the HP 82401A HP-IL Interfaces.
- Verify the proper operation of the adapter.

CAUTION

If one of the components of the system experiences a catastrophic failure during this procedure, the program and data files in the HP-71 may be lost. Be sure to make back-up copies of critical files before performing the test.

Testing the HP-71

Turn the HP-71 off and remove any HP-IL module or adapter that is installed in the HP-IL port. Turn the HP-71 on and off to reset all HP-IL associated system flags. Hold down the **ON** key and press the **✓** key. The HP-71 will respond:

INIT: 1

The initialization prompt.

2 **ENDLINE**

Execute a level 2 initialization to check the HP-71's circuits and ROMs.

ROM TEST 1G 2

When the first portion of the test verifies the proper operation of the circuits, the computer displays the ROM test sequence.

ROM TEST 1G 2G 3G 4G

When the test has been completed, the computer will display the results. This display indicates that all the circuits have passed the test.

ROM TEST 1G 2B 3G 4G

If one of the circuits is faulty, the character after its number will show a B instead of G, and the HP-71 requires service.

Testing the HP-IL Interfaces

To verify the operation of the HP 82401A HP-IL Interfaces, follow these steps for each interface:

1. Turn off the HP-71.
2. Install the HP-IL interface in the HP-IL port in the back of the HP-71.
3. Connect a single HP-IL cable between the IN and OUT receptacles of the interface.
4. Turn on the HP-71. If the cursor appears, continue with step 5. If the cursor doesn't appear immediately, press **ATTN****ATTN** (at least two more times). If the HP-71 won't turn on with the interface installed but will turn on without the interface, the interface requires service.
5. Execute **RESET HPIL**. This performs a self test of the interface's internal circuitry. If the cursor appears, the HP-IL interface is good. If **Self Test Failed** is displayed, the HP-IL interface requires service.

6. Execute **CONTROL ON**. This checks HP-IL continuity. If the cursor appears immediately, HP-IL continuity is good. If **Loop Broken** is displayed after several seconds, HP-IL continuity is bad. Try another HP-IL cable. If the HP-IL continuity remains bad, the HP-IL interface requires service.

Testing the Adapter

Assuming that the HP-71 and HP-IL interfaces are working properly, the adapter can be tested. With no interface or adapter plugged into the HP-IL port, turn the HP-71 on, then off to reset any HP-IL associated system flags. Insert two *known-good* HP 82401A HP-IL Interfaces into the HP 82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter under test, then install the adapter in the HP-71. Connect the IN receptacle of each interface to the corresponding OUT receptacle. *Do not cross connect the two interfaces.* Turn on the HP-71. The cursor should appear immediately.

To verify the operation of the adapter, execute a **VER#** command:

VER# **ENDLINE**

Execute the **VER#** command.

:1BBBB HPIL:1A HPIL:1A

Each HP-IL interface is identified by the message **HPIL:** followed by a two-character code identifying its release number (for example, **HPIL:1A** or **HPIL:1B**). The message should appear *twice* in the display.

If the HP-IL interface identification message appears twice, the adapter is working properly. (The two-character codes may differ between the two messages. This simply means that two different releases of the HP-IL interface are in use.)

If the HP-71 does not turn on, or the identification message does not appear twice, the adapter is defective. Refer to the Limited One-year Warranty section for your options at this point.

If the HP-71 does not turn on, the software will be lost and the HP-71 may not turn on even with the adapter removed. If this happens one of two techniques may be used to recover the system:

1. Hold down the **ON** key and press the **✓** key. If the message **INIT 1** appears in the display, press **3** **ENDLINE**. After a short time, the HP-71 is reset and ready for further use.
2. If no response occurs in step 1, remove the batteries and press **ON** for about 30 seconds to discharge the circuits. Install the batteries and turn on the HP-71. The **Memory Lost** message should appear, at which time the HP-71 is ready for further use.

A.3 LIMITED ONE-YEAR WARRANTY

What We Will Do

The HP 82402 Dual HP-IL Adapter is warranted by Hewlett-Packard against defects in materials and workmanship affecting electronic and mechanical performance for one year from the date of original purchase. If you sell your unit or give it as a gift, the warranty is transferred to the new owner and remains in effect for the original one-year period. During the warranty period, we will repair, or, at our option, replace at no charge a product that proves to be defective, provided you return the product, shipping prepaid, to a Hewlett-Packard service center.

After the Warranty Period

If your adapter should fail after the warranty period, follow the diagnostic procedures given in this appendix. In the case of a hardware failure, you should purchase a replacement product. For assistance in following the test procedures refer to "Technical Assistance" at the end of this appendix.

What Is Not Covered

This warranty does not apply if the product has been damaged by accident or misuse or as the result of service or modification by other than an authorized Hewlett-Packard service center.

No other express warranty is given. The repair or replacement of a product is your exclusive remedy. **ANY OTHER IMPLIED WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY OR FITNESS IS LIMITED TO THE ONE-YEAR DURATION OF THIS WRITTEN WARRANTY.** Some states, provinces, or countries do not allow limitations on how long an implied warranty lasts, so the above limitation may not apply to you. **IN NO EVENT SHALL HEWLETT-PACKARD BE LIABLE FOR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES.** Some states, provinces, or countries do not allow the exclusion or limitation of incidental or consequential damages, so the above limitation or exclusion may not apply to you.

This warranty gives you specific legal rights, and you may also have other rights which vary from state to state, province to province, or country to country.

Warranty for Consumer Transactions in the United Kingdom

This warranty shall not apply to consumer transactions and shall not affect the statutory rights of a consumer. In relation to such transactions, the rights and obligations of Seller and Buyer shall be determined by statute.

Obligation To Make Changes

Products are sold on the basis of specifications applicable at the time of manufacture. Hewlett-Packard shall have no obligation to modify or update products once sold.

A.4 SERVICE

Hewlett-Packard maintains service centers in most major countries throughout the world. You may have your unit repaired at a Hewlett-Packard service center any time it needs service.

If the adapter has failed, you should determine whether it failed within the one-year limited warranty period. If the adapter is covered by warranty, return it, shipping prepaid, to a Hewlett-Packard service center. If the adapter has failed after the warranty period, you should purchase a replacement.

International Service Information

A.5 POTENTIAL FOR RADIO/TELEVISION INTERFERENCE

The HP 82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter, with one or two HP 82401A HP-IL Interfaces installed, generates and uses radio frequency energy. If not installed and used properly; that is, in strict compliance with the instructions in this manual; it may cause interference to radio and television reception. The adapter has been manufacturer verified to comply with the limits for a Class B computing device in accordance with the specifications in Subpart J of Part 15 of FCC rules. The adapter has also been tested for compliance with VFG 1046/84. These guidelines are designed to provide reasonable protection against radio and television interference in a residential installation, but there is no guarantee that interference will not occur in a particular installation. In the unlikely event that the adapter does cause interference to radio or television reception (which can be determined by removing the adapter from the HP-71), you are encouraged to try to correct the interference by one or more of the following measures:

- Reorient the receiving antenna.
- Relocate the HP-71 or HP-IL cables with respect to the receiver.
- Move the HP-IL system away from the receiver.
- Plug the ac adapter into a different ac outlet so that the HP-71 and the receiver are on different branch circuits.

If neccessary, you should consult your dealer or an experienced radio/television technician for additional suggestions. You may find the following booklet, prepared by the Federal Communications Commission, helpful: *How to Identify and Resolve Radio-TV Interference Problems*. HP 82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter Owner's Manual Addendum

This addendum contains updating information for the *HP 82402A Dual HP-IL Adapter Owner's Manual*, part number 82402-90002, dated November, 1985.

Page 2-3, under DEVICE SPECIFIER: The *device specifier* must include the loop number at the end if the intended loop number is other than 1.

Page 2-4, under LOOP NUMBER: The *loop number* is a positive number or numeric expression which is rounded to an integer.

Page 2-4, under HP-IL INTERFACE COMMANDS: The following keywords do not accept a loop number parameter. (These keywords are not listed in the manual.)

- Keywords applying only to LOOP 1: ASSIGN IO and LIST IO.
- Global keywords which apply to all loops at the same time: OFF IO, ON INTR, and OFF INTR.

After executing OFF IO, all loops are disabled. If a subsequent RESTORE IO is executed, loop #1 is assumed unless the loop number is specified.

Page 2-7, under DEVADDR: The first two examples should read:

```
A=DEVADDR("PRINTER(2):2") @ PRINTER IS A:2  
B=DEVADDR("%16:2") @ COPY FILE1 TO :B:2
```

Page 2-7, under OUTPUT: The syntax should read:

OUTPUT

OUTPUT { *dev spec* | LOOP [: *loop#*] } [USING { *string* | *line#* }] [; *expr* [{ , | ; } *expr* ...]] [;]

HP-IL Version 1A Limitations

The first release of the HP 82401A HP-IL Module (VER\$="HPIL:1A") contains limitations on the operation of the HP-71 with multiple loops. If a more recent revision of the module is LOOP 1 (lower adapter slot), such as the 1B release, these limitations will not apply.

Limitation 1.

Some keywords do not allow the HP-71 to talk to two loops in the same statement. These keywords are CAT#, READDDC, READINTR, and STATUS. The work around is to split the functions among two statements.

```
10 PRINTER IS PRINTER:1 @ PRINT CAT$(N,":TAPE:2")
```

can be replaced by:

```
10 PRINTER IS PRINTER:1 @ A$=CAT$(N,":TAPE:2") @ PRINT A$
```

Limitation 2.

With the keywords ENABLE INTR and REQUEST, if a loop number is used, it must be a constant or a variable. More complicated numeric expressions may reset memory or lock up the HP-71. For example:

```
ENABLE INTR FNN(A) can be replaced by: A1=FNN(A) @ ENABLE INTR A1  
REQUEST VAL(A$) can be replaced by: A=VAL(A$) @ REQUEST A
```

Limitation 3.

If loop #1 has data available, higher numbered loops cannot interrupt the HP-71. This can occur if loop 1 is *not a system controller*. Consider the following code segment:

```
100 ON INTR GOTO 1000  
110 ENABLE INTR 2; 8  
120 SEND 2; IOY @ GOTO 120
```

If the system controller for loop 1 sends data to the HP-71 while the program is executing line 120, the ON INTR branch will not be taken. One work around is to configure the system so that loops which are not system controllers have higher numbers than loops that are system controllers. In a two loop system, the loop dedicated as non-system controller should be loop 2. Another work around is to use an ON TIMER interrupt to cause the interrupt to be detected.



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
